

Almost the first thing that you are asked when you enter a hospital for surgery today is – "Do you have a health directive?" If you don't, the hospital will require that you complete one.

There are **two** things that you should have along with your will... The **Durable Power of Attorney for Health Care** (DPOAHC) and a **Health Care Directive**.

The DPOAHC lets you name someone, called a health care agent, to make decisions about your medical care, including decisions about life support, if you can no longer speak for yourself.

The Health Care Directive lets you state your wishes about medical care in the event your attending physician determines that you have developed a terminal or hopeless condition and can no longer make your own medical decision.

To get copies of these two documents, contact your lawyer, or your physician, or a local hospital. Information may also be found on the internet. *Source: Overlake Hospital and AARP*

HIDDEN CAFFEINE AND NOT SO HIDDEN

Caffeine is used in all kinds of pills, tablets, and capsules, from pure caffeine tablets and weight loss pills to vitamins and pain relief capsules. Caffeine can have a dilatory effect on a person's heart. The effect can be determined by your weight and your ability to tolerate caffeine.

X-RAYS

Visiting the dentist isn't a joy, but there's a fresh reason to be wary of the doctor's "Open wide."

Dentists use X-rays to detect cavities and misalignments, but a study showed that patients diagnosed with meningiomas, brain tumors that are typically benign and noncancerous, were twice as likely as a group of tumor-free people to have had at least one dental X-ray. Radiation doses of such X-rays have been dropping with new equipment being installed in dental offices. However, it is not a bad idea to ask your dentist whether each new X-ray is necessary. Did you know you can avoid one of the leading causes of cancer death among men and women in about an hour? All it takes is a colonoscopy. The test may be difficult to warm up to, but the rewards are priceless, especially for your loved ones.

When colon cancer is found and treated in the early stages, five-year survival rates in the U.S. are around 90%. Despite the successful survival rate, only 39% of colon cancers are found in the early stages, which translates into thousands of unnecessary deaths a year. Legislative News:

Gainsharing Lawsuit Ruling and Appeal

As expected, the State of Washington has appealed a portion of a King County Superior Court decision which invalidated the Legislature's repeal of gainsharing benefits. The final judgment was signed by King County Superior Court Judge Richard Eadie on June 1. The appeal will now go to either the Appeals Court or the State Supreme Court. A judicial decision determines the court that will hear the appeal. The appeals ruling will probably take another two years before a final decision is made. The impact of that decision will affect the COLA lawsuit as the language in the COLA and gainsharing legislation is the same. It's another long wait. Stay tuned......

Ready to Vote in the Primary?

Be prepared for the August 7 Primary. While there are many statewide races, judgeships, etc. on the primary ballot, this column will concentrate on the Washington State Legislative races. Absentee ballots will be mailed July 20. Voter pamphlets will not be mailed this year. Know your legislative district and the candidates. Go to forums, open houses, fundraisers. Let the candidate know who you are, school retiree issues, and that you vote.
