Chief Seattle explained

On Thursday, February 18, at 1:00, SKSR hosted a virtual program presented by David Buerge and sponsored by Humanities Washington. The topic was *Who Was Chief Seattle?* We had a large registration of over 100 with 64 actual participants.

One thing viewers learned about Chief Sealth (note the spelling) is that because English speakers could not replicate the sounds of the native languages, they could only try to write down the name they thought they were hearing. The untechnical version of the story says that as a result, the name Seattle with the "tt" sound in the middle is what they could write down. More information about that issue and about "Seattle's" involvement in the development of the area from Suquamish to present-day Seattle was the focus of the program.

The presentation provided an interesting view of the community-building activities of Chief "Seattle" and its over-all impact on how Seattle emerged as a frontier community. David Buerge made many references to local areas such as West Seattle, Pioneer Square and Elliot Bay-all of which had importance in the early activities and growth of Seattle.

S p e a k e r
Buerge is both an historian
and a story teller who drew a clear picture of
Chief "Seattle." More of that story is presented in
his book, "Chief Seattle and the Town that Took His
Name," published by Sasquatch Books. It is the first
biography of Chief "Seattle" intended for adults.

Mediterranean-style diet breakfast ideas

The Mediterranean diet is a heart-healthy eating plan. This way of eating is based on the traditional diets of the countries bordering the Mediterranean Sea like Italy, Greece and Turkey. This diet is high in vegetables, fruits, whole grains, beans, nuts and seeds, olive oil, fish and seafood, moderate portions of dairy products and smaller amounts of lean protein, like poultry. Red meat is eaten only occasionally.

There is no specific meal plan or portion size. The foods are used as a guide to promote healthy eating choices.

Healthy fats are a mainstay of the Mediterranean diet. Olive oil, nuts and seeds contain monounsaturated fats. These fats have been known to lower cholesterol levels. Fatty fish, such as herring, tuna, sardines, salmon and lake trout, are rich in Omega-3 fatty acids that help decrease triglycerides and decrease the risk of stroke and heart failure.

Starting your day with a Mediterranean-style breakfast is nourishing and satisfying. Rather than skipping breakfast, having a heart-healthy start to your day is easy to accomplish. It can be sweet or savory or just a twist to your daily breakfast routine. Start off your day with good heath and delicious food.

Breakfast ideas Mediterranean style

- Scrambled eggs with onion, peppers, mushrooms on a whole grain tortilla
- Greek yogurt with berries and nuts
- Muesli or granola with yogurt
- Peanut butter and banana on whole grain toast
- Whole grain pita with hummus, cucumber, spinach and tomato
- Avocado and egg toast
- Savory Spanish oatmeal with Chorizo and red pepper sauce
- Fig and ricotta toast
- · Avocado, banana, date and spinach smoothie

Overnight Oats Recipe

Make up to 4 jars at once to keep in the fridge for quick, grab-and-go breakfasts throughout the week.

Ingredients:

½ - ²/₃ cup coconut milk, nut milk or cow's milk
 ½ cup old-fashioned oats (avoid instant, which can turn mushy)

1 teaspoon maple syrup, honey or agave syrup Pinch of salt (optional)

1T hazelnut spread (optional)

Directions:

Combine milk, oats, maple syrup and salt in a pint-sized jar and stir. Cover and refrigerate overnight.

Just before serving, top with a sliced banana, blueberries or your favorite fruit and crushed hazelnuts or your preferred nuts.

NW-1 Coordinating Council report



wenty-three people attended the NW1 Zoom meeting on March 8. Closed Captioning was available with Zoom and appreciated by those who have a hearing loss.

WSSRA Executive Director Alan Burke updated the group about the 2021 annual meeting, which is scheduled for June 3-6 in Pasco. It is possible, due to COVD-19, that the meeting may be a hybrid. The other possibility is a virtual meeting with business, which must be done in June, i.e., budget, election of officers, amendment changes to Bylaws and Policies of the organization. After WSSRA's April Board meeting, more definite plans will be in place. At the time of this publication, three Bylaws amendments and one policy amendment will be presented to the WSSRA Board, which will give either a *Do Pass/Do* Not Pass/or No Recommendation to the assembly.

The recent WSSRA Retirement Planning Zoom meeting was very successful with 1,700 attending. It is highly likely that another retirement planning Zoom session will be scheduled in April; one two-hour meeting with DRS and the Health Care Authority and another one-hour meeting with Social Security and a Q & A session.

To date, the WSSRA legislative priorities have a mixed success rate. Maintaining the \$183 health-care
