SENIOR SWIM - Phyllis Fiege

The Lynnwood City Pool has good opportunities for seniors for exercise and swimming. On Monday and Wednesday from 1:00 - 1:45, an instructor takes the group through exercises in the water. There is usually free swimming for 15 minutes. Cost is 50 cents each time--no need to sign up or register. On Friday from 10:30 - 11:30 is an Open Swim for Seniors at a cost of 75 cents.

Come and join the group. The pool is not crowded. Use of sauna is included in the swim fee. Emphasis is on providing a service to seniors. For those with Red Cross instruction ackground and a desire to assist, please call Greg, pool manager. Some of the non-wimming seniors would like some extra help in learning to swim, others would like help in improving skills in swimming or diving.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE - Bowers and Olmstead

A bill that was of special interest to AARP and the Senior Citizen Lobby was SSB 3458 - Motor Vehicle Insurance. This bill would have mandated lower insurance rates for persons age 55 and older had they completed approved defensive driving courses. It was probably reasonable to assume that the popular 55 Alive/Mature Driving Course sponsored by AARP and offered by our RTA Unit would qualify for this insurance reduction. However, this bill died in committee, but not until it had been watered down considerably. Latest plans call for resubmitting this bill next year in its original form.

The State Senate Budget still contains \$545,000 for continuing the three respite care projects (this is an experiment giving home nursing care to keep seniors from going to nursing homes).

There will be a reduction in chore services for low income seniors.

There is still hope that some provisions of the HEALTH CARE COST CONTAINMENT (ESHB 1077) will become law.


