

#### HEALTH & PROTECTIVE SERVICES

The WASHINGTON STATE HEALTH CARE AUTHORITY is in the process of securing bids from health care suppliers that should be less costly, and be available January 1995. All retirees will be receiving info within the next few months.

At the Federal level, several health hills were combined into one called the "STARK" bill that came out of the HOUSE WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE, will be "marked up" (changed) in the HOUSE ENERGY & COMMERCE COMMITTEE, and then will go to the EDUCATION & LABOR COMMITTEE.

To complicate the health issue further, the SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE AND THE SENATE LABOR & HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEES are planning various changes in any health bill that comes their way. However "marked up" some type of health bill should reach President Clinton in June or July.

AARP is concerned that the STARK bill that President Clinton says he would sign, does not provide any type of long term coverage. AARP has not endorsed any plan, but has long insisted that some form of long term care and prescription drug coverage is very important to retirees. AARP is concerned that 58 million Americans are without insurance at some point during the year, and two million Americans a month lose their insurance. What American families pay for health insurance has risen 55% in just three years.

Letters and phone calls to Congress members are needed and effective. Urge their support for home and community based long term care, which is critical to the survival of the American family. Prescription drugs and universal health care coverage is essential in any plan. Medical strides - good news from the University of Pittsburg Cancer institute - researchers report they have developed a vaccine against the MELANOMA deadly form of skin cancer. Doctors used the patient's own cancer cells which were inactivated so they would not multiply and make new tumors, then treated with a substance called DNP, that when reinjected into the patient tricked the patient's white blood cells to destroy the remaining cancer cells! 

THE LEGISLATIVE SEASON IS OVER!
THE LEGISLATIVE SEASON IS BEGINNING!



Congratulations! We did a good job during the last legislative session. Thank you for all of your good work. It would not have been done without you.

Now, we have the challenge of the next session. Some creative thinking is going on with Lee Ozmun, our lobbyist in Olympia, other members of the Retirement Coalition and legislators. The Joint Committee on Pension Policy had its first meeting of the interim, and COLA improvement is on the agenda this year!

The creative process includes finding ways to achieve a true COLA while reducing the costs! But - most important to our success right now is preparing to send people to Olympia who are knowledgeable and supportive of our issues. With term limitations looming, many legislators are running for positions outside the legislature. That means that the next session could have almost as many newcomers in the legislature as we had in 1992. That means that we have a job to do, now."

As a first step in organizing our campaign for the legislature, please put on your calendar the June Sno-King meeting. In addition to installation of officers for the coming year, the meeting will be devoted to preparing us to have a bigger-than-ever effect on the fall legislative campaigns. Lee Ozmun will speak on the results of the last session and the outlook for the coming session. The rest of the meeting will be devoted to explaining how each of us can be of help to legislative candidates.

Educators are probably the most valuable assets any campaign can have. We have the skills a campaign needs. We also have the willingness and the determination. We can be important contributors without having to spend a great deal of time. Legislators know that everyone's time is valuable, and they appreciate whatever we are willing to give.

The second step is the July picnic. All of the announced candidates for the legislature will be invited to attend so that you can hear what they have to say, meet them and decide which ones you would like to help.

DIRECTIONS TO MILL CREEK COUNTRY CLUB: From I-5 take exit #183 which puts you on 164th SW.
