



Washington has neat day trips for you

Day trips are excellent ways to enjoy our beautiful state, particularly in autumn after the many visitors have left. Colorful fall leaves are in full show on the eastern slopes of the Cascades, accessible via six mountain passes—North Cascades, Stevens, Snoqualmie, Blewett, Chinook and White. The latter two passes, both ending in Yakima, also offer oustanding views of Mt. Rainier on sunny days

Chinook Pass, reached by continuing eastward past the Crystal Mountain ski area, is our personal favorite. And an overnight stay in Yakima provides more time for an orchard tour and pursuit of the winery route through the Yakima Valley. The area has a number of excellent restaurants, as well.

Another personal favorite for a multi-day jaunt is the smalltown triangle of Klickitat, White Salmon and Goldendale. Tucked into the eastern foothills just north of the Columbia River, these three towns are picturesque and relaxing. After viewing Chinook Pass and taking in the Yakima Valley, travelers can continue south from Yakima on Highway 97 to Goldendale.

Either turn westward on Route 142 at that point and meander through the fall leaves to Klickitat, or continue south to see the Maryhill Museum and Stonehenge replica at Maryhill.

Either route can then take travelers westward on Highway 14 along the north shore of the Columbia River, with an overnight stay just off the highway in White Salmon. Try the picturesque White Salmon Inn, for example.

But let's not digress too far from those day trips that can be so rewarding and enjoyable. SKSR member Donna Murrish and husband Ron recently took a day trip to beat all day trips and even managed to leave the "driving" to others! The couple drove to Kenmore Air Harbor one morning at 7 a.m. and parked their car. Boarding one of the familiar yellow and white float planes and swinging by Lake Union to pick up additional

passengers, the Murrishes headed for Victoria, B.C.

They were treated to a birdseye view of the San Juan Islands
and the Straits of Juan de Fuca.
Landing less than an hour later in
the harbor below the stately
Empress Hotel, the couple
strolled to the hotel for a "truly
wonderful buffet breakfast."
Then it was off to catch a whalewatching boat. Heading out to
sea for a couple of hours, the
passengers caught sight of
several whales as well as
enjoying the ride and the vista of
Victoria itself.

The couple returned to port with time yet to wander around the shops, visit the British Columbia Parliament and the city's famous museum, or enjoy a city tour. But the Murrishes decided instead on a local bus trip to Butchart Gardens to admire the gorgeous flowers on a perfect, sunny day.

Returning to their float plane, they flew back to Kenmore and



Tn June, 87 school employees from Edmonds, Northshore and Shoreline earned the new designation of "Retiree." 
